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ANAM QUARTETTHAUS TO HOST SEASON OF AUSTRALIAN MUSIC IN LONDON

The Australian National Academy of Music (ANAM) is pleased to announce a partnership with London's the Royal Albert Hall and the Royal College of Music to present a season of the ANAM Quartetthaus designed by bluebottle in London as part of the UK/Australia Season 2021-22, in September this year.

The initial concept for a specialised listening space was proposed by Ben Cobham, co-director of bluebottle, in 2010 igniting a rich collaboration between ANAM and bluebottle, whereby ANAM Quartetthaus was born. A temporary structure especially designed for listeners to experience the theatrical and visceral art of the string quartet at close proximity, the ANAM Quartetthaus seats just 52 patrons in two circles around a slowly rotating central stage.

Situated in the shadow of the Royal Albert Hall, one of the world's largest, most famous *circular* concert venues, the beautiful timber cube will house and celebrate Australian and British string quartet composition. A first appearance outside of Australia, the ANAM Quartetthaus season comprises the largest celebration of Australian string quartet composition to be ever heard outside the country, and includes two world premieres by Jack Symonds (Sydney) and Matt Laing (Melbourne), an ANAM alumnus. The season will also include music by Australian composers Darrin Archer, Joe Chindamo, Brett Dean, Ross Edwards, Jack Frerer, Percy Grainger, Alfred Hill, Miriam Hyde, Elena Kats-Chernin, Liza Lim, Richard Meale, Peter Sculthorpe, Paul Stanhope, and Nigel Westlake.

The London program builds upon the recent <u>ANAM Set</u> and cements ANAM's reputation as champions of Australian composition.

This repertoire will be performed alongside music by leading British composers past and present, including the world premiere of a new work commissioned by ANAM from UK composer **Hannah Kendall** for the season.

Six performances each day for ten days will feature Australian and British String Quartets performing works from both countries. Australian ensembles travelling to London for the season are the **Artamidae Quartet** (comprised of four current ANAM musicians), **Affinity Quartet** (one current ANAM musician and three alumni) and the **Australian String Quartet** (which includes three ANAM alumni). British quartets sharing the circular stage with these ensembles include the acclaimed **Marmen Quartet** and, from ANAM's partner institution London's Royal College of Music, the **Fiora Quartet** and **Oriole String Quartet**.

Joining the ANAM musicians and alumni on tour will be a group of filmmakers, graduates of the Australian Film, Television and Radio School (AFTRS), who will document this historic undertaking.

The London season of ANAM Quartetthaus is made possible with support from the Australian Commonwealth Government (through DFAT and the International Cultural Diplomacy Arts Fund), Victorian Government (through Creative Victoria), the South Australian Government (though Arts SA), and a consortium of leading Australian and British philanthropists.

David Harrington (Kronos Quartet) said after attending the inaugural season of ANAM Quartetthaus in Melbourne: "ANAM Quartetthaus represents the biggest leap in immediacy and potency for the string quartet as an art form since microphones and speakers arrived. ANAM Quartetthaus is like having a portable 54-seat Esterhazy Palace. I want one in my back yard! When people begin to realize how visceral the experience can be of hearing the flesh of fingers and rosined horse hair attack the strings, when the lifealtering experience of being able to be so close together with the inner voice of music becomes known, then the reason the string quartet is so alive and thriving will be clear: because it sounds so intensely and wondrously human."

ANAM Artistic Director Paavali Jumppanen said: "ANAM Quartetthaus grew from a simple idea: to create a space shaped at every turn by the music to be performed within it. A venue released from the expansive rhetoric of traditional concert presentation, just as the intimate musical form of the string quartet is stripped of the heavier rhetoric of larger scale genres. Bringing together six string quartets, 24 musicians, 12 from Australia and the UK each to perform music composed by past and present Australian and British composers in the ANAM Quartetthaus, provides an up-to-date vehicle to examine the question "Where Are We Now?"

Michael Napthali, UK/Australia Season Director, said: "When confronting the provocation — "Who Are We Now?" — posed by the UK/Australia Season, a colossal creative response is heard literally and figurative in the shape of ANAM Quartetthaus. The UK/Australia Season is excited to support this unique endeavour bringing together the most comprehensive celebration of Australian and British quartet writing ever performed, resting in the shadow of the iconic Royal Albert Hall."

Lucy Noble, Artistic Director of the Royal Albert Hall, said: "We're delighted to be taking part in the UK/Australia season and to host such an innovative performance concept for the first time outside Australia – as well as opening up new performance spaces around our site. The design of the ANAM Quartetthaus creates a completely new way of experiencing live music and we can't wait to get inside."
